Course: EDUC 220 Classroom Management

Course Description: EDUC 220 is an introduction to K-6 classroom management techniques for the K-12 classroom teacher or paraeducator. Topics that will be covered include: physical space, behavioral norms, safety, time management, managing student work, and managing other special classroom needs.
