Formulate techniques and strategies to modify student activities based on student behaviors and skill level. Demonstrate an understanding of a variety of classroom management programs

Nov. 15-21:	Read Chapter Eleven (<i>Managing Recitations and Discussions</i>). Read activity #1 on pages 329 and 330. Post your recommendations for the trouble spots in Mr. B's discussion in the Discussion Forum. Respond to at least one of your classmates. Due November 21st.

Nov. 22-28:	Read Chapter Twelve (<i>Responding Effectively to Problem Behavior</i>). Read activity #1 on page 376. Describe how you would handle situation b, d, and g in your classroom. Post to the Discussion Forum. Respond to at least one of your classmates. Due November 28th .

Course Requirements and Evaluation:

There are no exams in this course. However, students will complete weekly assignments and participate in discussion forums. Students will also develop a portfolio which is due at the end of the semester. Items that must be in the portfolio include the following:

- Classroom guidelines: rules/guidelines/consequences you will have in your future classroom
- Classroom Management Program
- Movie review
- 2-3 page reflective paper on what was learned in the class and strategies you will use in your classroom

Classroom Management Program

Students will select or be assigned one of the following nationally known and implemented classroom management programs:

- ITC Classroom Management Program
- Love and Logic
- Positive Behavior Supports
- Responsible Thinking Process
- Restitution

Students will conduct independent research on their assigned program and develop a presentation that will be shared with their classmates at the end of the semester. This presentation can be in the form of an outline, Powerpoint presentation, or other format. Students must include a bibliography of their research in addition to the presentation.

Relationship to Campus Theme:

- Students will use a variety of technology for research and presentation purposes. Technology used will include Microsoft Word, Powerpoint, and the Internet.
- Students will explore the classroom management and its affect on learning.
- Students will use their problem solving and critical thinking skills to meet the requirements of the course.
- Demonstrations of these skills will be shown through class discussions, journaling, and presentations.
- **Classroom Policies:** The class is highly interactive with significant discussion components. Grades will be based not only on content learned, but active participation in this interactive atmosphere. Assignments must be in on time or students will be penalized by 30%.
- The instructor expects students to come to class prepared. This class will require extensive reading, research, and discussion. Late assignments must be submitted to the instructor by the next day. The student will lose at least 30% of the points. If the assignment is not submitted within a week of its due date, students will lose 50%. Assignments handed in after one week of it is due date will lose 75%. Assignments received two weeks or more after due date will receive 0 points.

When doing projects and assignments, you will be expected to follow the laws concerning copyrighted material and proper documentation of sources when presenting information obtained from printed material and Internet searches. Failure to comply with these laws is justification for failure in this course. <u>Make sure you understand the law.</u>
