Course Prefix/Number/Title: ASC 087 College Writing Prep

Number of credits: 3

Course Description: A precollege writing course that prepares students for College Composition 110. Provides instruction in writing error-free sentences, solid paragraphs and well-organized essays.

Pre-/Co-requisites: None

Course Objectives: Review and provide instruction in basic sentence skills and structure, essay development (including organization, formatting, and content), and reading comprehension and discussion. Upon successful completion of ASC 087 (C or above), students should have the skills necessary to enter into English Composition I.

Textbook(s): Langan, John. *College Writing Skills with Readings*. 7th or 8th Ed. McGraw-Hill (available at bookstore)

Course Requirements: Regular attendance and completion of in-class assignments, homework (mostly short writing assignments) and essays. Students will need the textbook, regular access to a computer, and an email address which they check daily.

Tentative Course Outline:

Week 1: Basic sentence structure (subjects/verbs)
Week 2: Basic sentence structure (fragments/run-ons, punctuation)
Week 3: Basic sentence structure (subject/verb agreement)
Week 4: Sentence skills (verb tenses)
Week 5: Sentence skills (word choice, editing)
Week 6: Sentence skills (editing, clauses)
Week 7: Midterm writing assignment
Week 8: Paragraphs and organization (kinds of sentences)
Week 9: Paragraphs and organization (intros/conclusions/body, quoting and paraphrasing)
Week 11: Paragraphs and organization (structuring kinds of essays, quoting and paraphrasing)

Week 12: Essay development (kinds of essays, outlines) Week 13: Essay development (research papers/sources, works cited) Week 14: Essay development (MLA formatting, note cards) Week 15: Essay development (editing and formatting) Week 16: Final Essay due (this will be gradually completed over 3-4 weeks)

General Education Goals/Objectives: N/A (though it would be Communicate Effectively and Think Critically)

Relationship to Campus Theme: We will be using technology every day, not only in conducting a distance learning course on three campuses simultaneously, but by making use of the DCB online campus (Moodle) and participating in the Pearson MyFoundationsLab pilot project with NDUS. We will also focus on using software to properly format and submit college essays, and using library resources to conduct research.

Classroom Policies: Students will not be able to makeup in-class daily assignments, which count towards their participation grade, unless they have made previous arrangements with the instructor. Late homework and writing assignments will be penalized 10% for every day they are late. Students may redo any written assignment for a better grade, but will still receive their original late penalty (if applicable).
