# **EDUC 220 Classroom Management Syllabus**

Course: EDUC 220, Classroom Management

**Number of credits:** 3 credits

**Course Description:** EDUC 220 is an introduction to K-6 classroom management techniques for the K-12 classroom teacher or paraeducator. Topics that will be covered include: physical space, behavioral norms, safety, time management, managing student work, and managing other special classroom needs.

- Describe management skills as related to the classroom.
- Give details regarding unique aspects of the classroom including special needs and violence.

- Demonstrate an understanding of a variety of classroom management programs


