**Course Description** 

A survey of the criminal justice system and prerequisite for all criminal justice courses; examines the criminal justice process, including police, courts, and corrections; familiarizes students with theories of crime; highlights contemporary issues and places special emphasis on

tribal criminal justice.

professionals.

- \* Understand the basic terminology of the criminal justice system.

\* Be able to define the stages of the criminal justice

process.

- Identify the major components of the criminal justice
- system: police, courts, and corrections.
- \* Become aware of the various criminological theories and

how they relate to the criminal justice system.

#### Requirements

**Examinations: Three** examinations will be given. Examinations will give the student the opportunity to demonstrate knowledge of the Criminal Justice System, and will count for 60% of the total grade.

**Assignments:** Critical thinking assignments will be given and will comprise 30% of the total grade.

Attendance and Participation: Students are expected to attend class every week (unless class is cancelled) and participate in in-class discussions, and group work. Participation will make up 10% of the total grade.

Extra Credit: Extra credit opportunities will be offered throughout the semester, and will be posted on the course main page.
