



Course Prefix/Number/Title: EMS 276 – Field Clinical I

Number of Credits: 3 credits

Course Description: This course allows the Paramedic student to apply learned classroom skills and knowledge under the direction of a preceptor in a pre-hospital setting. The student will be stationed with a licensed ALS ambulance service. The student will input patient contact information into the Platinum Planner system.

Pre-/Co-requisites: EMS 275 – Introduction to Clinical Experience

Course Objectives: This course intergrates comprehensive knowledge of pediatric and adult assessment, airway and ventilation and IV therapy into the clinical settings of an advanced level ambulance service, which is intended to iprove the knowledge of EMS personnel.
