Tentative Course Outline:

General Education Competency/Learning Outcome(s) <u>OR</u> CTE Competency/Department Learning Outcome(s): This course aligns with the specific general education guidelines established by Dakota College at Bottineau. Specifically students will address the following goals: Students will be able to analyze musical forms using the appropriate terminology, evaluate the social events that influenced their production and coherently explain the relationships between the arts, humanities and society as outlined in Goal 7¹. Specifically Objectives 2 and 4.²

Relationship to Campus Focus: This course uses the campus theme of "Nature, Technology and Beyond," in part to explore how Americans draw inspiration from the natural world to define national identity. Moreover we explore the complex dynamic relationship between science, nature and art to describe the world at specific moments in time.
