Continued Growth and Accomplishments

Last fall, I noted that the college was continuing its momentum in a number of key areas. I am pleased to note that these accomplishments continue.

The college experienced a record spring semester enrollment, with 1,112 students taking at least one class from DCB. This is an overall increase of 26 percent in spring semester enrollment over the past five years (882 students in 2018). This growth is due to hard work on the part of faculty and staff who show every day that they care about students and their success.

This spring also recorded another "first" in our records. Three DCB athletic teams earned berths in national tournaments. The Ladyjacks Basketball team traveled to Port Huron, Michigan, for participation in the NJCAA Division II Tournament, after decisive wins late in the season. Special recognition is due to Coach Wayne Johnson as he ends his tenure as head coach for the Ladyjacks. This was Coach Johnson's third trip to the national tournament with a Ladyjacks team.

The men's hockey team qualified for its third consecutive trip to the ACHA Division II National Tournament. This year's team had a great season and made it the Final Four round in St. Louis, Missouri. In a division dominated by four-year colleges and universities, the Lumberjacks showed that they are a team to be reckoned with. Coach Travis Rybchinski was named the West Region Coach of the Year. Congratulations, Travis!

The third team participating in a national tournament was our new women's hockey team. In only their second year of being a sport at the college, they secured a spot at the ACHA Division II women's tournament, also in St. Louis. In some excellent hockey games, the Ladyjacks made it to the championship game, losing by one goal. The Ladyjacks are doing their part to build on DCB's long hockey tradition.

The success of these three teams did so much to spread the word about Dakota College at Bottineau across the country. Congratulations to all three teams and for making those of us with ties to DCB

(and MSU-B, NDSU-B, and the School of Forestry) proud!

In past columns, we have shared the news of two exciting projects, namely the renovation of Old Main into a Center for Rural Health Education and the acquisition of a facility in Minot that will be remodeled to house college-level career and technical education (CTE) programs. These projects are headed toward reality with the selection of architectural firms to develop the plans for these two facilities. Dan Nostdahl, a DCB alum, is partnered with EAPC through his firm Nostdahl-Liptack and brings a tremendous amount of knowledge about Old Main to this effort. Elsewhere in this newsletter is information on how you can contribute to this worthwhile project, which will contribute not only to the need for health professionals in our region, but also increase full-time student enrollment on campus. Similarly, Ackerman Estvold has been hired to develop plans for the Minot CTE Center. Both projects are now in the preliminary design phase, with a goal of selecting contractors early this summer.

We are especially pleased to highlight the completion of the college's new Dining Center, which officially opened on March 11. If you are in the area, make plans to stop by and enjoy a meal in the new space, which is connected to the Knudson Student Center. It is a terrific addition to campus life and the combined space is sure to be come the hub for student life.

Finally, this will be my last column as Campus Dean. I plan to semi-retire at the end of June and am planning some new business ventures. It is with mixed emotions that I leave the college, as I have really enjoyed working with a great group of people at the campus and community. I have a special place in my heart for Dakota College as this is where I started college, where I began my experiences as a community college educator, and now end my career in higher education. So, one chapter ends, and another begins. Thanks to all you for your support during the past six years, and especially your support of Dakota College!

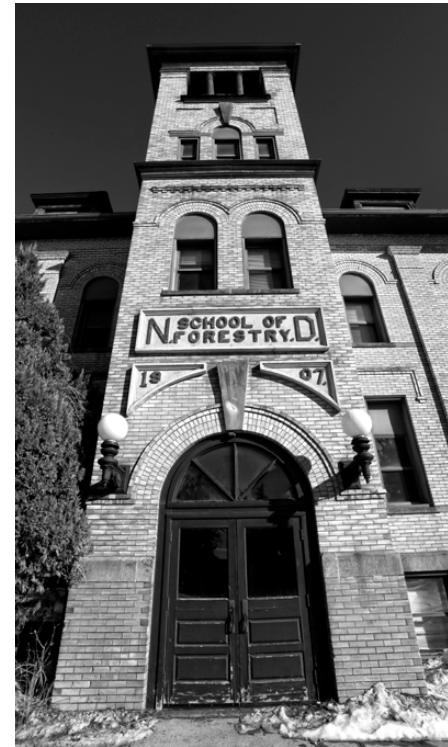

Love for Hockey & Health Leads DCB Alumnus to Chiropractor Career

Dr. Scott Taylor chose Dakota College at Bottineau because he wanted to continue to play at a competitive level of hockey after he graduated from Red River High School in Grand Forks. “Playing hockey at DCB was a huge benefit not only in college, but in life. The friendships that are formed from playing in a program that requires such dedication and hard work develops players and people. To this day I am good friends with multiple people from the hockey program and DCB,” says Dr. Taylor.

“Attending DCB gives you the traditional things that are often touted with a smaller school, such as small class sizes and easier access to instructors. There are things that might not be talked about as much, such as less time commuting when you live in a small community. It’s easier and faster to get around

campus too,” Dr. Taylor says.

The '99 grad earned his Associate of Science degree from DCB before continuing his education at South Dakota State University where he received his bachelor’s degree in Biological Science. Prior to his senior year at SDSU, Taylor became interested in a natural approach to health from a friend who introduced him to chiropractic healthcare. “I initially started down the path to becoming a Chiropractor as a way to work within the hockey world, but I’m now more of a general practice provider.” In 2005, Dr. Taylor graduated from Palmer West Chiropractic College in San Jose, California. He has been practicing for about 17 years in California.

He finds great satisfaction in the ability to help patients achieve life-altering effects from chiropractic treatment. “A treatment that sometimes

may not be as complex as a surgical procedure but has the simplicity of mobilization and improved body mechanics,” Dr. Taylor explains. “I would tell incoming freshmen who are considering a health career to go for it! Taking a mixture of general prerequisite and health care classes will allow you to advance faster through college and give you the ability to consider a wide array of health-related careers.”

Dr. Taylor says attending DCB prepared him well for his future. “Looking back, it was my first experience living away from home and it was an easy transition. The size of the dorms wasn’t overwhelming and

it’s a friendly environment as compared to a larger university system,” Dr. Taylor says. “It might not have been the specific classes that prepared me for living in a larger city such as San Jose or Los Angeles but having a background from Grand Forks and Bottineau gave me more insight than somebody who has only lived in a larger city. From social dynamics to politics, it helped me become a more well-rounded individual.”

Although he moved to a warmer state, Dr. Taylor continues to stay in contact with DCB by supporting the Logrollers and other charitable initiatives. “The Logrollers helped make it possible for our hockey team to compete and raised money for us to play when I was in school. I’m happy to be in a position that I can help DCB students coming through the hockey program,” says Dr. Taylor. “I believe playing a team sport prepares you for working on a team or with a group. When people know how to work together in sports, it translates well in life.”

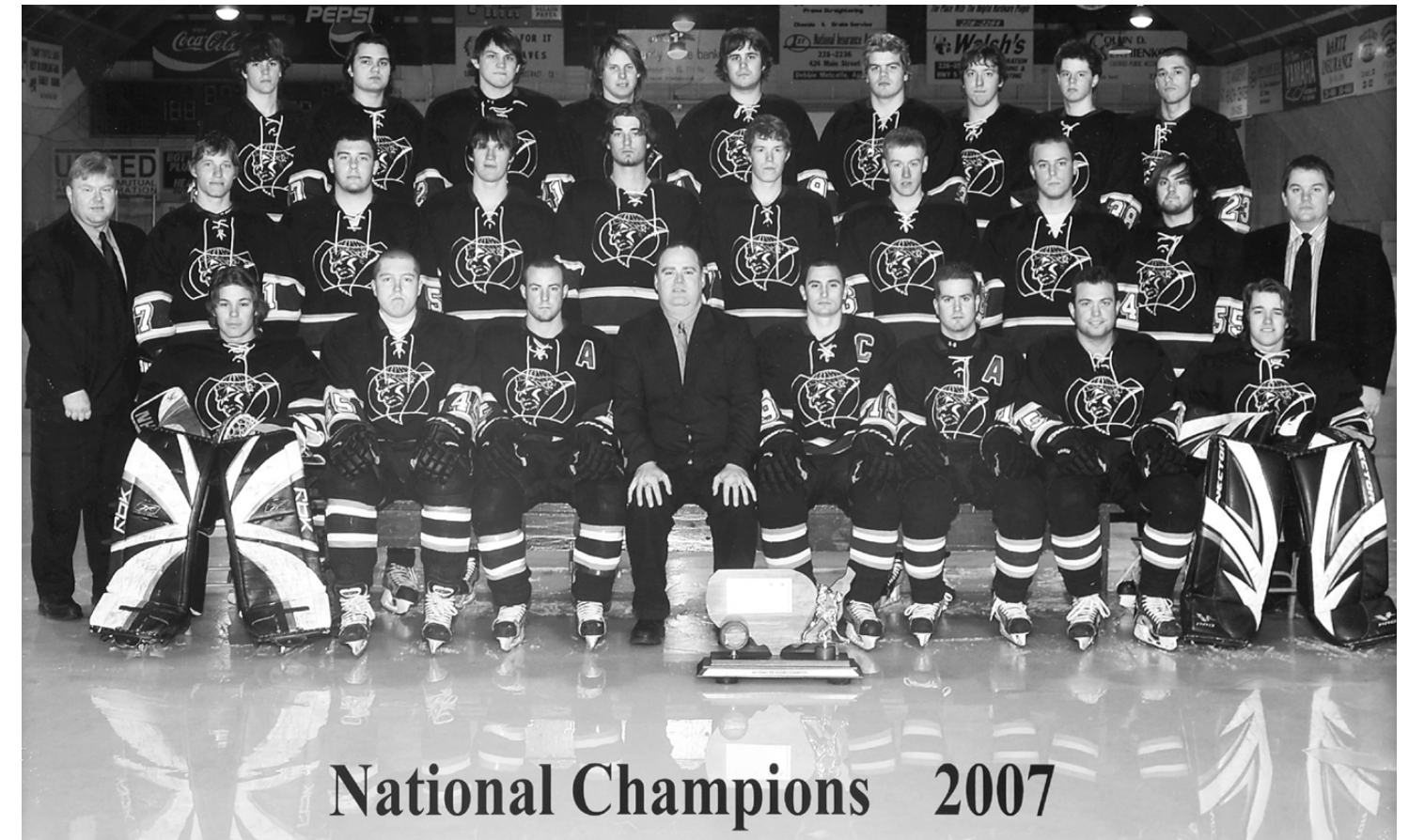


DIANN BECKMAN

Lumberjack National Champion Hockey Team and Shannon Smith Inducted into Athletic Hall of Fame

The 2007 Lumberjacks were a team to remember. A well-rounded group of players coming from four different countries: United States, Canada, Sweden, and Latvia.

The team finished the year with a 23-6-1 record and captured the NJCAA National Championship, marking the school's 5th National Championship. MSU-Bottineau played in the Prairie Junior Hockey League based out of Saskatchewan. In post season play, the team swept Monroe Community College of New York to win the school's first championship on Lumberdome ice. The Jacks won the first game 5-4 on an overtime goal, then completed the sweep by defeating the Tribunes 2-1 to win the crown.

The Lumberjacks also took care of business in the classroom as they were named NJCAA Academic Team of the Year with a 3.23 GPA. Marty Bilodeau was named to the NJCAA All-Academic Team.

Sam Aide, Eric Everson, Quinn McIntosh, and Jared Kopp were named All-Americans.

Shannon Smith is a Pontiac, Michigan native. She transferred to Dakota College at Bottineau in the Fall 2010. She played one season with the Ladyjacks basketball team. Shannon's work ethic made her a fierce competitor. She was a team first player and a leader on and off the court.



Shannon excelled during the 2010-11 season averaging 10.6 points, 9.1 rebounds, and 5.3 assists per game. She was named NJCAA Division II All-American, All MonDak and All Region XIII and MVP for Region XIII.

My goal has always been to find my way to a career as a game warden. I always kept that goal in mind and availed myself to any and all opportunities to train for a life in that area of service.

For as long as I can remember, hunting and fishing have always been passions of mine. Whether I was out fishing with my dad, pheasant hunting with my uncle, or deer hunting with my grandpa, those are the things I've loved to do.

When I was in high school, I joined JROTC, eventually becoming Battalion Commander. The order and discipline just made sense to me, enough so that I

went on to join the North Dakota National Guard as a military policeman...again following that path of service and order.

As high school graduation neared and I began checking out colleges, Dakota College at Bottineau had the best of all worlds - a school that offered a degree in Wildlife Management, an advisor who had the same passion for the outdoors as I did, incredible hunting and fishing opportunities, and all set in a beautiful landscape. Between semesters, I worked for the Forestry Service expanding my knowledge and love of the outdoors.

As graduation from DCB neared, the dream of being a game warden only became that much more real. If I could give one piece of advice to someone interested in being a game warden, I would say follow your passions, embrace opportunities to learn, and always believe that your goal is never further than your next opportunity.

The Lumberjack and Ladyjack hockey teams participated at the ACHA Division II tournaments hosted in St. Louis, Missouri. This is the third consecutive year the Men's Lumberjack hockey team has earned a spot in the national ACHA Division tournament.

Prior to being a part of the ACHA division, the Lumberjacks won ten NJCAA championships while playing at the Junior College level.

The Ladyjack hockey team inaugural season in 2020-21 was a difficult year of competition due to COVID. After just starting the program last year,



the Ladyjacks are playing in their first national tournament. The Ladyjacks finished their regular season at 10-4, and were the second seed from the west region. They became the Runner Up to the National Champions in only their second year of incorporation.



The Ladyjack basketball team is one in 16 teams competing at the National NJCAA Division II National Tournament hosted in Port Huron, Michigan. This is the Ladyjacks

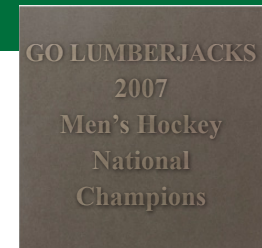

Dakota College Celebrates 115 Years



Dakota College at Bottineau has been around almost as long as North Dakota itself. The state constitution, ratified in 1889, provided for a forestry school to help promote the growth of trees on the prairies. January 2022 marks the 115th year of Dakota College's existence.

In 1889, the state's constitution included an article that would provide North Dakota with a school of forestry. It wasn't until new immigrants to the state of North Dakota voted in 1894 to have the city of Bottineau as the state's official site for the North Dakota School of Forestry.

By 1906, twelve years after the 1894 election, residents of Bottineau decided to take the matter of the school into their own hands. Local businessmen of Bottineau raised \$8,000 and built a two-story wooden frame building on 15 acres of land that was donated by the Bottineau Turf Club. In January of 1907, the North Dakota School of Forestry opened its doors with 30 students, and curricula in a four-year forestry program, and a one-year business program. The School of Forestry also offered preparatory courses for students that completed the seventh grade.

North Dakota's landscape has changed a lot since 1889, both physically and culturally. The School of Forestry has progressed over the years, establishing new buildings on campus to support evolving

programs. The college has had seven official names during the past 115 years. See the list below.

Since 1996, Dakota College at Bottineau has been an affiliate campus with Minot State University (MSU). As such, it is administratively attached to its parent institution. The University President oversees operations at both sites and is located in Minot, ND. The Chief Executive Officer at DCB is the Campus Dean.

Dakota College at Bottineau provides students with a quality education in a caring environment. The institution values diversity and personal enrichment by promoting engaged learning for employment and university transfer. Dakota College emphasizes nature and technology to accomplish its mission through an array of curricula, programs, and services.

Even though a lot has changed since then, including the school name and mission Dakota College is here to cultivate student growth. Growth doesn't mean exactly the same thing in the 21st century that it did in the 19th. While natural resource programs remain among the best in the upper Midwest, Dakota College offers degrees in fields such as health care, web design, photography and information technology along with a strong liberal arts program along with one of the most robust distance-learning programs in the State.

Dakota College at Bottineau has changed to prepare today's students to build the landscapes of the future.
